BRIDGING AND RECOGNITION CEREMONY

The Bridging and Recognition ceremony was held at the Cintas Center on the campus of Xavier University. Each student was recognized and officially presented with a special silver medallion. In 2007, Edyth Janszen Schloss '45 sent MND a letter with a picture of her mother, a graduate of the class of 1907, wearing a gold medallion that she received at her graduation. In the letter, Mrs. Schloss asked that in honor of her mother, the graduating senior who ranks first in her class wear her mother's gold medallion at graduation.

Elizabeth Mansfield '23 wears Mrs. Schloss' mother's medallion. MND's administration decided that it is important for all graduates to have a visible reminder of the lessons learned while at Mount Notre Dame. The medallion is a symbol for our graduates to find and spread the goodness of God in all the experiences of their lives. Each member of the Class of 2023 received a replica of the 1907 medallion at their Bridging and Recognition Ceremony.







The number of American students who go abroad has more than tripled in the past two decades and this increase is likely to continue. International education is on the rise, and for good reason.

Study abroad programs take substantial resources for planning and execution. Curriculum design, or the development of a formal course of study coupled with informal opportunities for learning about the place visited, requires significant planning and logistical support.

The exchange programs at Mount Notre Dame offer numerous benefits to our community. We strive to provide global opportunities for all MND students. In fact, the experiences are so important to our school vision that we have a dedicated faculty member, Ms. Julie Yorn, who serves as MND's International Program Coordinator. Ms. Yorn delivers seamless integration and coordination of global immersion and is an invaluable asset to the program.

Visiting students from our exchange countries (Chile, France, Japan, and Spain) typically attend a full schedule of MND classes, join clubs, attend extracurricular events, and interact with MND students. MND students who travel to our exchange schools share their experiences through video sessions with classes while they are in the host country and/or through classroom presentations when they return to MND.

Students who participate directly (as travelers and hosts) in our programs gain new world perspectives, expanded cultural knowledge and experiences, international relationships, improved language skills, and potential for personal growth and responsibility.

Paving the Future

Remember when....

- MND was a stop for many public school buses?
- More than one non-family member could drive in a car with a newly licensed driver?
- Students could park on Columbia Avenue and all of the side streets?

Things have come a long way and we are happy to announce that we are adding additional parking spaces for our students. The new parking lot, which will be built on property owned by MND, will add 70 new spots and be accessible through the Reading Auxiliary Lot. MND is excited to pave the path forward to enable all students an easily accessible place to park.



On the side of a mountain in rural West Virginia, a contingency of teenage girls from Mount Notre Dame High School made

their way from the large rambling "main house" of the Big Laurel Learning Center down to the woodshed as two unbothered horses looked on. The gregarious man, known to the girls as "Angel's Dad," greeted the students with a cheerful and contagious enthusiasm as he quickly began to explain the large pieces of foreign-looking equipment that stood before them.

They listened attentively as he described how to engage the blade, when to reverse it and how far back to keep hands when holding the logs. He told them where and how to stack the finished firewood and kindling and made clear the value this fuel would bring in keeping the learning center warm. They learned they'd get to meet Ms. Becky who lived further down the mountain when they delivered wood for her later that day. And with that, the girls put on their work gloves and got to the business of splitting and stacking hundreds and hundreds of pounds of wood while their laughter and buoyant conversation lilted through the crisp October air.

Big Laurel Learning Center is, "...a mountain community inspired by the voice of God among us," and a Notre Dame Mission Volunteers AmeriCorps initiative which strives to promote healing and help by providing education, outreach and spiritual renewal in Southern West Virginia. The voice of God was evident in every moment of this 4-day service immersion trip-the glorious changing leaves decorating the mountain, the songs sung at the nightly bonfire, hands sticky with roasted marshmallows, hearts reflecting on the work of the day.

There was a rhythm to the daily agenda: cook, eat, pray, work, reflect and relax and always together. This togetherness, a reinforcement of the sisterhood that Mount Notre Dame fosters in its students with such great care, was aided by the usual immersion trip ritual of confiscating phones except for

an hour each evening. That was merely a formality as reception was essentially non-existent, and the girls would happily concede

defeat returning to card games and hide-and-seek after stretching their devices in vain toward the starfilled sky unable to get a single bar.

Narcotic addiction is often considered a disease of despair. Mingo County had, for a time, the dubious distinction of being an epicenter of this disease even making its way into the national headlines. The girls learned of this despair and the economic disparity faced by residents from the manager of the free thrift store that serves members of the community. The manager informed them that of the over 5000 counties in the United States, Mingo County is ranked in the bottom 1% for household income. Jobs in coal mines can lead to injuries leading to pain pills and joblessness. Flooding is a regular threat for those who live in town and infrastructure, both physical and digital is iffy. Life there is hard.



Life there is beautiful. As the students sorted and racked donations in the store, they learned of the strength and unity of this community. There was nothing special about that Friday afternoon, but it was astonishing to see the steady flow of donations process through the loading dock, a blessing as it was equally matched by the customers in need—a young family found a car seat, an older woman chose a beautifully-knitted scarf, a couple left with clothing and a lamp.

God's voice was speaking at the free childcare center visited as the director recounted her path from client to director now positioned to help so many. God's goodness reverberated at the aquaponics center built over a reclaimed coal mine where wastewater from in-house tilapia tanks grew vegetables that, along with the fish, would help supply the local foodbank. God's goodness

beamed from the faces of those teenage girls who eagerly looked forward to sharing God's voice back home in a brand-new way.



On May 5, 2023, more than 100 members of the greater Cincinnati community came together to celebrate Mount Notre Dame's mission of educating and empowering young women to learn, live, lead and serve for the MND 20th Annual Golf Classic presented by Flynn & Company at The Mill Course.

Event participants couldn't have asked for a better day on the course. The weather was perfect, not a cloud in the sky, and the energy was contagious. The course was filled with sponsors, MND alumnae, students, families, and friends. The investment of time and treasure benefits our thriving community which encourages each student to reach her greatest potential through a personalized learning experience, exceptional student development programs that build strong and positive character as well as spiritual growth and Christian leadership.







Mount Notre Dame's My Action Plan (MAP) Program is a four-year empowerment journey that provides challenging and engaging experiences to encourage growth in the

nine Empowerment Characteristics. Through this program students become active members of the MND community, write and assess personal and academic goals, create a four-year academic plan and participate in grade level activities. The program is based on four key themes of MND's mission statement that challenge our students to recognize and develop their unique capabilities to learn, live, lead and serve.

The MAP Program begins the summer

before an incoming student's freshman year. Every MND student is assigned a MAP guide; a faculty or staff member that meets with the student and her parent(s) to introduce them to MND, the MAP program and answer questions.

A notable component of the MAP Program is the yearly goal setting that is done by every student. At the beginning of each year, students create goals for themselves and then

assess them periodically throughout the school year. This has a profound impact on the ability for a student to self reflect, work towards growing in a variety of areas and having a plan to make it happen. This program, which is unique to Mount Notre Dame, prepares students to be proficient in goal setting and accomplishing goals.

The culmination of the MAP program is the presentation of the Senior Capstone Projects. The event is attended by MND alumnae who serve in various panel capabilities as well as notable business

leaders from the community. The showcase of projects is a true testament to our BOLD Future!









LASTING COMMUNITY

Named Endowed Scholarship Program

Mount Notre Dame first established an endowment in 2003 to ensure long-term sustainability of our school. Since then, MND's endowment has reached \$10.6 M with more than 80 named scholarships and endowed funds.

Most scholarships are awarded to students who need financial assistance, therefore your gift helps deserving students and their families with the cost of tuition. This year, 39% of our students are receiving financial assistance from MND in the amount of \$1,221,000. Next year's tuition, for an incoming freshman, will be \$13,855 plus a \$1,200 common class level fee which includes the student's tablet. As you can imagine, the rising cost of an all-girls, Catholic education is challenging for many families.

Financial literacy refers to the ability to understand and apply different financial skills effectively, including personal financial management, budgeting and saving. The U.S. Department of Education says that 3.8 million American adult women have financial literacy skills below a basic level (Annuity.org).

Enter MND's Economics and Personal Finance class! Social Studies teacher, Mr. Bill Hughes, is committed to helping his students develop the foundational financial skills to succeed. This year, his students in the Class of 2023 completed a personal finance project where they engaged in a variety of activities designed to empower them to take charge of their own financial well-being. Activities included:

- Researching salaries for potential careers and using those salaries to create household budgets
- Tracking their present-day spending habits
- Investigating the home and car buying process and learning to calculate taxes and interest rates
- Exploring different types of home and auto insurance and how to find a policy that is best for their individual needs

- Analyzing how changing interest rates at the Federal Reserve impacts the price of monthly loan payments
- Learning how to file their taxes with the IRS with all students filling out 1040 tax returns based on their project salaries

Mr. Hughes noted, "So often throughout the course of this project, students would come to class and say, 'I was talking to my dad about this last night,' or 'my brother is majoring in Finance and we were talking last night.' It was rare to hear a student say she talked to her mom about this project or even the course. I hope this project shows my students that they can take charge of their personal finances now and in the future."

Rose Lavelle Teaming up with TIAA

MND alumna and USWNT member Rose Lavelle '13 previously teamed up with financial service provider TIAA in their campaign to empower women to invest for retirement. Rose served as an ambassador to help spread the word that on average, women retire with 30% less. As part of the campaign, Rose passed an autographed TIAA #RetireInequality soccer ball to MND. 

The hallways of Mount Notre Dame were lined with students, staff, and faculty. The air carried an anticipation that seemed to slow time in a way that few things can in today's fast-paced society. Faces were not glued to cell phones or other electronic devices. Rather, heads were craned in all directions looking for any glimpse of what was about to happen. Parades through the hallways are nothing new to the spirit of MND. The senior class does it every year, state-bound athletes do it before major athletic endeavors...but this felt different.



And then the rumblings increased, cheers began echoing, hands were clapping, and our sisterhood united across generations as we all became witness to the main event – the culmination of our day of honor as our beloved Sr. Ruth began parading the halls on her farewell tour to begin her retirement tour. Sr. Ruth Day - May 11, 2023 - was a day for the MND history books.

Sr. Ruth was born in Cincinnati, Ohio to Mary and Bill Bedinghaus. As the oldest of nine children, Ruth was a born leader. She recalls first feeling a call to become a sister in first grade. She believes her desire to become a sister was directly due to the inspiration and admiration of the sisters who taught her. Her calling remained a part of her, and she secured a role to be a teacher's aid for summer religious education classes at St. James when she was only in the seventh grade. As Sr. Ruth tells it, "The idea just stuck and became stronger such that I felt I wanted to respond."

The high school years at Mount Notre Dame instilled in Sr. Ruth a desire to teach. The role she carved out at St. James as a religious education teaching assistant grew to commanding her own class at St. James for the four years she attended MND. While at MND, Sr. Ruth participated in many activities in addition to her religious dedication. She was a member of the MND Swimming, Volleyball, and Softball teams, as well as Chorus.

After graduation from MND in 1969, Sr. Ruth focused on her calling and entered the Sisters of Notre Dame de Namur. After she became a teacher, Sr. Ruth spent a year teaching at MND before working a half a year at St. Vincent de Paul school in Cincinnati and four years at Bishop Harley High School in Columbus. Then, she was called home to MND to begin her legacy. Sr. Ruth was a true and dedicated servant leader during her time at MND. She has made an invaluable impact on the lives of countless students. athletes, and colleagues through her gift of teaching biology and anatomy, coaching volleyball and softball, her academic curiosity, and sharing her natural humor with everyone. Her ability to let her students guide her throughout her career was invaluable as evidenced by everyone's favorite namesake...Sparky. For anyone who had Sr. Ruth for Biology,

you know that Sparky was born out of genius intuition. Sr. Ruth had to turn a topic that some students viewed as uncomfortable into a lifelong learning memory.

When asked, Sr. Ruth is resolute in why she chose MND saying "I specifically wanted to teach at MND because I wanted to give back what I had received. MND is a community of learners. The learners include adults, who are dedicated to being and modeling lifelong learning as well as the students who are being guided towards the same. I see us as collaborators with parents and each other to be that village that is referred to in the African proverb that I have often heard 'It takes a village to raise a child'. I hope I have given to MND at least some of what I have received."





The culmination of Sr. Ruth Day was a parade of legacy, memories, tears of joy, and surprises! As Sr. Ruth turned the last corner entering the final stretch of the hallway parade route, she was stopped at the closed chapel doors. As the cheering continued, and the signs and pom poms were waving, the doors slowly opened. Behind the doors, in the cocoon of the MND chapel stood over 40 of Sr. Ruth's "sisters" standing arm in arm. A group of Sisters from the Sisters of Notre Dame de Namur, of course were there to celebrate this momentous occasion. Behind them stood many classmates from the MND class of 1969 who have their unique sisterhood with Sr. Ruth. The sisterhood bonds have no limits. The sisterhood of MND was omnipresent and somehow transcended the past and the future.

How do you put into words what Sr. Ruth Bedinghaus '69 means to MND? You can't. The words could never convey it all – but that moment, when time stood still for generations of the MND sisterhood, you could feel it. Thank you, Sr. Ruth for all you are to MND. You have given so much more than you will ever know.







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
