

The hard and unforgiving frozen ground of an Ohio winter covered with a foot of compacted snow marks a stark contrast to the Brazilian rainforest found a continent, a hemisphere, away. In Anapu, Brazil, it is now the peak of summer. The sweltering air is heavy with humidity, humming and buzzing with insects and birds whereas the Ohio snow muffles and mutes the red cardinals and the dark-eyed juncos visiting from the north. These two scenes seem to have little in common, but to Sr. Dorothy Stang, "I have to fill myself they were both were considered home. spirituality, so I have

This February 12th marked the 20th anniversary of Sr. Dorothy's assassination. She was shot 6 times by a gunman hired by a local cattle rancher on a muddy road in Anapu, Brazil. She died fighting to protect the rights of the Brazilians who were promised and assigned land by the government, land that was being taken by the cattle ranchers and the loggers who would burn the houses and murder anyone who stood in their way.

Sr. Dorothy knew she was on a death list. When she came back to Reading in 2004 to visit her Sisters at the convent, she made it clear she was likely heading back to her death. She told her dear friend, Sister Jo Anne Depweg, why her visit to the convent was so important. Sister Dorothy said, "I have to fill myself with scripture and spirituality, so I have the strength to go back and keep working."

> Though the stakes are nowhere near as dire, that same ethos of retreat and service is a long-standing tradition of Mount Notre Dame. It is evident in the yearly retreat opportunities provided for every student in every grade. Here, students are fortified with scripture, spirituality and prayer. MND does not require service hours as a graduation requirement, yet every single student has contributed to the service-oriented culture of the school. It is from their hearts that they serve, not from a mandate.

Sister Dorothy, declared a modern martyr, is a paradigm example of the service and prayerfilled life so integral to MND. She is a shining example, one that has a devoted and robust following here at MND. It is that of selfless service and love as an expression of God's goodness, even in the most difficult and dangerous of times.

The world is better because of Sr. Dorothy's determination to answer God's call, no matter how frightening or hard it may have been. Individually, it is unlikely that most will be called to such harrowing and selfless service. Yet the world is still magnificently better when we heed God's call. It is in that spirit that we tend to the hearts of MND students -- to strengthen their resolve to serve God by serving others done so with prayerful retreat, scripture and spirituality.

What does it mean to educate for justice, peace, and care for all creation? At Mount Notre Dame, these questions are not just theoretical—they guide our mission and inspire our students to act. This year, our school community is deeply engaged with two of the Hallmarks of a Notre Dame Learning Community, a vital legacy that connects us to the Sisters of Notre Dame de Namur. The seven Hallmarks are the guiding principles that shape the spiritual and educational journey of every student. Each year, MND emphasizes specific Hallmarks so every student experiences their profound messages during her four years. This year, we focus on:

Our commitment to honoring the Hallmarks and theme extends beyond symbolic gestures. This year's MiND-fuel Reads Common Read selection, A Long Walk to Water by Linda Sue Park, weaves together the stories of two Sudanese children navigating the challenges of water scarcity. This powerful book aligns seamlessly with the Sisters of Notre Dame de Namur's Clean Water Project. During our October Common Read Day, students shared insights from the book and learned more about Sr. Dorothy's work and the Clean Water Project's transformative impact in Africa.

This fall, our freshmen visited the Photovoltaic Water Learning Lab on the Sisters' property adjacent to our school This innovative space allows students to see firsthand how clean water technology can change lives. Building on these experiences, our freshmen will develop and implement a school-wide leadership project to raise awareness and funds in support of the SND Clean Water Project. Saint Julie Billiart's words, "Teach them what they need to know for life," propel us forward. Through the Hallmarks and shared learning opportunities, we embrace our role as educators and mentors, integrating the values of justice, community, and care for creation into every facet of our school life. As we continue this journey, we invite you-our community-to reflect on how we can all do justice, love goodness, and walk humbly with God.



Student Intern Transforms School Website

In an inspiring display of talent, initiative, and technological innovation, Stephanie Waning, a junior at Mount Notre Dame has redefined what it means to make a lasting impact. Over the course of the summer, she undertook the monumental task of working with the MND Marketing team in redesigning the school's website—a project that has transformed how students, parents, and faculty engage with the school community.

A Vision for Change

The project began with the desire for an update to the website that was both visually appealing and increased functionality. The outdated interface struggled to keep up with the needs of its users, often leaving visitors frustrated or unable to find important information. Enter Stephanie, who took on the challenge of reworking the structure of the website to better align the functionality and user interface of the website. "I had heard about user experience," Stephanie explained. "When I saw the issues with the current website, I knew I could help make it better for everyone."

Rising to the Challenge

Under the guidance of the MND Marketing department and with input from stakeholders, Stephanie was an integral part of the redesign from concept to completion. She began by researching competitive sites both locally and nationally, and then created

wireframes that enhanced the functionality of each button on the website. The end result was an updated design that prioritized easy navigation, accessibility, and responsiveness across devices.

Stephanie explains, "I contributed to the MND Marketing team by helping them update the website. I think it was beneficial on both sides because the marketing team got to see what the website should look like through a student's perspective. It was beneficial for me because I got to see how much work goes into updating a website."

Learning Through Experience

While the project showcased her natural skill, it also pushed Stephanie to grow in new ways. She learned to work collaboratively with various departments, experienced presenting her ideas to department managers, and worked to create revisions based on feedback. The

opportunity gave her a huge advantage in networking for future academic, career and personal endeavors. "This job gave me an opportunity to build professional skills and connections. When I update my resume, I'll be able to share specific examples of what I've learned and accomplished."

A Legacy of Innovation

Experience

The first section of the redesigned website launched in the fall of 2024, right before the start of admission season. Additional sections were released in early winter. Empowering Young Women: The Case for Women's Health

High school is a critical time for personal and physical development. While general health class is a State of Ohio curriculum requirement, there is a growing need for specialized classes that address the unique health concerns of women. Women's Health encompasses a broad range of topics, including reproductive health, menstrual health, mental health, nutrition, and disease prevention-all of which are vital for young women to understand as they transition into adulthood.

Mount Notre Dame's Women's Health class was developed after a group of students shared their interest in such a course during a focus group with Mrs. Day. The course provides our students with the knowledge and tools they need to lead healthy, empowered lives. Some course topics include personal safety, fitness, nutrition, relationships, stress/anxiety reduction, mental health and first aid. The course also provides activities to encourage and promote a healthy lifestyle.

Taught by MND veteran teacher, Mrs. Sally Knoll, this elective has proven popular with our students. Over 40% of the Class of 2024 took Women's Health in addition to the required Health course. The class creates an environment of support and well-being.

"I look forward to teaching this class every year," expressed Mrs. Knoll. "It's been rewarding to witness the significant personal growth of the seniors over the past three years. It's inspiring to see how their experiences at MND have shaped them into more confident, capable and well-rounded women."

MND launched a new partnership agreement with Xavier University that provides direct admission status with a stackable scholarship to MND students who qualify.

Through this partnership, students at MND who meet specific academic and admission criteria will be offered direct admission to Xavier University, streamlining the traditional college application process. In addition, qualifying students will receive an annual \$1,831 stackable merit scholarship in recognition of the partnership. This agreement aims to reduce stress, assist in affordability, and provide guaranteed admission for qualifying students. The partnership supports the shared commitment of both institutions to make higher education more accessible and affordable.

MND Principal Karen Day notes, "Our students are bright, driven, and ready to carry their Mount Notre Dame legacy into the next chapter of their education. This partnership with Xavier University gives future MND alumnae a direct pathway to continue their academic journey at an institution that shares our commitment to excellence in academics, faith, community engagement and service and will further encourage them to be compassionate leaders and women of integrity, prepared to make an impact in the world. It's a true testament to the enduring value of an MND education."

The partnership will begin with MND's Class of 2025 and eligible students will begin receiving their offers of direct admission. In their shared commitment to Catholic education, both institutions look forward to working together to support the academic and career aspirations of students.

MND's premier academic programming prepares students for the challenges and opportunities of higher education. MND currently offers 20 Advanced Placement courses and 13 College Credit Plus Courses all of which are taught on campus but MND faculty members. Last school year, MND students outscored the national test score average in 14 AP test areas with a 100% pass rate in five test areas.

Fall 2024 Athletic Highlights

Cross Country

The Varsity team finished in 4th place in the GGCL this season and placed 9th overall at the OHSAA District meet.



Golf

The varsity team finished the season with a 10-5 record and finished in 3rd place in the GGCL. They finished in 7th place at the OHSAA Sectional tournament. Junior Campbell Drum qualified as an individual for the District tournament after posting an 18-hole score of 84. She went on to win the OHSAA District tournament at Pipestone Golf Club after shooting a 74. This qualified her for the OHSAA State tournament at NCR Country Club where she finished in 38th place out of 72 golfers. Congratulations Campbell!



New Varsity Head Coach:

Don Minning – Coach Minning wrapped up his first season as Head Varsity Golf Coach this fall. Don started at MND as the Varsity Assistant Coach in 2023 and was promoted last winter. He led the Cougars to a 10-5 record and helped Campbell Drum reach the State Golf tournament.



Field Hockey

The Varsity team continued the streak of appearances in the state final four after taking down Ursuline in the Regional Final by a score of 1-0. The Cougars went on to lose to Shaker Heights 3-1 in the State Semi-Final game. They finished the year with a 16-5 overall record and went undefeated in the GGCL and the Southwest Ohio Field Hockey League. Head Coach Sarah Pisciotta was named GGCL Field Hockey Coach of the Year. This was their 6th consecutive GGCL title, 4th consecutive SWOFHL title, and 4th consecutive regional title. The JV team finished with a 9-6-1 record and were GGCL champs.



Soccer

The varsity soccer team made another deep postseason run after making their 4th straight appearance in the OHSAA Regional Final game. They would fall to Loveland in the Regional Final after going into extra penalty kicks. On their way to the Regional Final, they won their 5th straight District title. The JV soccer team finished with a 10-3-3 overall record and a 5-2-1 GGCL record. Head Coach Kiersten Roof was named GGCL Soccer Coach of the Year. This is their 4th GGCL championship in the last 5 years. The Cougars finished the season with a 12-3-5 overall record and a 7-0-1 GGCL record which crowned them GGCL champs.



Tennis

The Varsity team finished 10-8 overall and 4-4 in the GGCL, earning them a 3rd place finish in the league. Senior Charlotte Scharfenberger and Junior Madeline Mannarino finished in 2nd place at the OHSAA Sectional Doubles tournament and qualified for the District tournament. The JV team finished 5-9 overall and 2-6 in the GGCL. The JV team also won the Coaches Classic Tournament.



Volleyball

The Varsity volleyball team finished the year with a 16-10 overall record after playing one of the toughest schedules in the country. They won three postseason matches and won a District Championship. The JV and Freshman teams both finished with a 14-7 overall record and a 3-5 GGCL record.

Scholarship Granting Organizations: Your Tax Dollars, Your Choice

By donating to the MND Scholarship Granting Organization, you take control of where your tax dollars go. You can transform lives, support Catholic education, and receive a full tax credit in return. It's a win-win for everyone-students, MND, and you as the donor! If you're unfamiliar with Ohio's Scholarship Granting Organizations (SGOs) and how they work, don't worry-you're not alone! Here's a simple breakdown to help you understand what they are, why people donate, and how you can use your tax dollars to support the young women of Mount Notre Dame.

What is an SGO?

An SGO (Scholarship Granting Organization) is a state-approved nonprofit that collects donations and distributes scholarships to help students attend private K-12 schools. The goal is to make a high-quality, faith-based education more accessible, particularly for families in need of financial assistance. Mount Notre Dame partners with the MND Scholarship Granting Organization, meaning all donations designated to Mount Notre Dame SGO directly benefit students attending Mount Notre Dame by providing tuition assistance. Ohio state law requires that at least 90% of all donations to an SGO go directly toward student scholarships, making this an incredibly efficient way to support MND students who need it most.

Who Can Donate to MND's SGO?

Any Ohio resident who pays state income tax can donate, including:

- ✓ Individuals
- ✓ Married couples filing jointly
- \checkmark Businesses that owe Ohio state taxes

If you live in Ohio and pay state income taxes, you can redirect a portion of what you owe to support MND students instead!

Why Would Someone Donate to MND's SGO?

There are two major reasons:

- 1. A Dollar-for-Dollar Tax Credit for the Donor
 - The State of Ohio allows you to receive a dollar-for-dollar tax credit for your SGO donation.
 - You can claim up to \$750 per individual or \$1,500 for married couples filing jointly if they both donate in their own name.
 - Instead of paying that money in state taxes, you can redirect it to support scholarships for young women at MND—at no additional cost to you!
- 2. Helping MND Students Access a Transformational Education
 - Your donation provides scholarship assistance to families who want their daughters to experience MND's outstanding academics, strong faith-based education, and empowering all-girls environment.
 - Donating ensures that talented young women, regardless of financial circumstances, can benefit from all that MND has to offer.

I'm currently a volunteer on the MND Finance Committee which is where I first learned about the Scholarship Granting Organization (SGO). It's such a powerful and impactful initiative. As a first-time participant, I'm excited to share this valuable opportunity with others.



What did you do to learn more about SGOs

I started to look into it further and discovered that is a separate non-profit organization for the school that is singularly focused on tuition assistance for students and that donors receive a state tax credit (not deduction) up to \$1,500 for joint filers. The donations can be made up until the filing deadline for tax year 2024, so families still have plenty of time to support and take advantage of the program. In other words, Ohio allows you to "spend" some of the state income taxes you must pay anyway to provide tuition assistance for students seeking an education at MND. SGO at MND is a win-win-win for our school, taxpayer donors and students.



How would you describe this opportunity to donate to someone who's never heard about it before?

While it may seem too good to be true, believe me, everyone should take advantage! You directly benefit while giving back to MND. To put it simply the SGO tax credit authorizes donors who contribute to directly to the MND SGO to receive a dollar-for-dollar reduction in their state taxes up to \$750 per individual taxpayer. The school website is also a great resource that offers all the information you would need to learn more and I am sure anyone in the MND Development Department would be happy to answer any additional questions.



There are so many wonderful local Catholic schools to support via the SGO. Why support MND?

We couldn't think of a better place to support and a better investment. MND has been such a blessing to our family and we will continue to do whatever we can to pay it forwards ensuring other young women and their families get the chance to experience being part of the MND family!

Mount Notre Dame High School proudly welcomes home one of our own, Tommi Lea Harsch '09, an alumna whose passion for the performing arts has brought her full circle. Harsch, a graduate of the class

of 2009, has recently been named the new Artistic Theatre Director at MND. Her appointment marks a new chapter for the school's acclaimed theatre program, one that promises to inspire and elevate future generations of students.

A Journey Rooted in Passion Harsch's love for theatre flourished during her years at MND, where she was an active participant in a countless number of the school's theatrical productions. From her first audition to her final curtain call as a student, she embraced a love for storytelling, collaboration, and performance that would shape her career. After graduating in 2009, Harsch pursued her passion by earning a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree in Musical Theatre from Wright State University. Following a few years residing out west in Las Vegas, NV, Tommi spent 3 wonderful years traveling the world and serenading audiences at sea, working for Royal Caribbean International! While she loved the time spent seeing the globe, she was certainly missing her close-knit family, and a move back to Cincinnati seemed to be the answer. Though unsure of what it would bring in terms of her work, she

Harsch also hopes to foster meaningful collaborations with local theatre professionals, providing students with mentorship and real-world experiences.
